# Re-Imagining Health regulation



- Rapid Innovation Technology like AI and telemedicine is outpacing outdated regulatory models.
- **Health Workforce Crisis** Migration, burnout, and shortages demand flexible, supportive regulation.
- Patient Expectations People want dignified, transparent, and responsive care systems.
- **System Resilience** Adaptive regulation helps systems respond to shocks like pandemics.



# Re-Imagining Health regulation



- Reduced Harm Compassionate oversight lowers fear, improves practitioner behavior, and promotes healing.
- Evidence-Based Oversight Data enables smarter decisions, risk targeting, and policy reform.
- Regional Integration In the EAC, harmonized data and mutual recognition need adaptive governance.
- Trust & Accountability Compassion and transparency build public and practitioner trust in regulators.

#### COMPASSION

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- Shift from punitive to supportive culture
- Support for distressed practitioners
- Respect for patient dignity
- Empathy vs Authority
- Hand holding style of regulation





Pillar 3 of Reimagined Health Regulation: DATA-DRIVEN

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- Real-time workforce data
- E-licensing and biometric systems
- Regional data interoperability
- Outcome-based monitoring
- Data informing adaptability and compassion regulation modalities

# Flexible Licensing for Cross-Border Practice

 Regulators must adapt licensing systems to allow real-time recognition and mobility of qualified health professionals across EAC states.

## Agile Laws to Support Innovation

• National legal frameworks should permit task-shifting, digital health, and evolving scopes of practice while aligning with EAC protocols.

## Emergency Response Mechanisms

 Adaptive regulation allows rapid deployment of practitioners across borders during crises (e.g., epidemics), under temporary reciprocal licensing.

## Practitioner-Centric Complaint Systems

• A re-imagined framework should support peer review, mediation, and rehabilitative approaches rather than punitive-only models.

#### Protection of Patient Dignity Across Borders

 Uniform ethical standards across EAC ensure patients are treated with respect and care, regardless of jurisdiction.

# Support Systems for Migrant Practitioners

 Compassionate regulation ensures fair treatment, psychosocial support, and inclusion for health workers relocating within the region.

## Regional Workforce Intelligence

 A harmonized, real-time health workforce registry across EAC enables efficient verification, deployment, and planning.

#### Evidence-Based Policy Reform

• Regulatory decisions (e.g., disciplinary trends, shortages, licensing gaps) should be informed by shared cross-country data analytics.

## Development of a online database

 EAC Medical and Dental Councils are in the process of developing a platform where the EAC registrars can easily share and access practitioners' data

- Review legislation to allow for adaptability
